The birth and death of Jesus/Yeshua/ישוע





Let's try working backwards

- To find out when Christ was born, let's work backwards from his death.
- But first we need a little history before we can speak about his death.

The Passover

- A sacred holy time of remembrance
- The observance was kept each year
- Leviticus 23:5
- Exodus 12:1-14

Why did Israel Keep a Passover?

It was also an emotional connection for Israel to keep in remembrance of their exodus from Egypt.

An activity of remembrance to bring us to the ultimate Sacrifice


- The lamb of YHWH/Yahweh/Jehovah/יהווה was our sacrifice, once and for all
- 1 Corinthians 5:7
- John 19:14-42

Key Points for consideration

- A very serious account of the Son of God's crucifixion in John 19 and key verses to consider are 14, 31, and 42.
- Verse 14 indicates the passover feast day was being celebrated on the day of Jesus'/Yeshua's/ישוע death.
- Verse 31 indicates that there was to be a special sabbath or a "high day".
 - This would be the annual feast of unleavened bread.
- And the first day and the seventh day of the feast of unleavened bread were special days of no work Leviticus 23:6-8.
- Verse 42 indicates that there was to be a day of preparation.
 - This would be the day of preparation to celebrate the feast of unleavened bread.

Christ was the Passover

- We have proved
 - o That the Lord Jesus/Yeshua/ישוע was our Passover.
 - Observance occurred in the first Jewish month also known as Abib/Nisan.
 - Now we can formulate an approximate time of his birth.
 - But there is another important piece of information to help solidify this idea, and that is a number.




Service at the Age of 30

- Under the Law, it was generally practiced that the service work in the tabernacle began at the age of 30.
- Numbers 4:3, 35, 39, 47
- How does this apply to Jesus/Yeshua/ישוע/
- Luke 3:23

It is evident that Jesus/Yeshua/ישוע began his ministry at the age of about 30 years. His Father, YHWH/Yahweh/Jehovah/יהווה had a magnificent plan to preach to the Gentiles. But that's a story for another day. The master plan has a key nestled in the prophecy of Daniel 9:26,27. Would you like to read about it?

Relating Jesus/Yeshua/ישוע to a Prophecy

The relation of Jesus/Yeshua/ישוע to the prophecy in Daniel 9:27 is important because it provides insight about a special time period which lasts for one week. This is a very special week when the Messiah is "cut off" or crucified and killed. He is killed in the middle of the week. Or after 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ days. What is amazing is that there is a correlation between weeks and years which is also equal to 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ years or 1260 days.



Christ Ministered for 3 ½ Years

There are many scholarly opinions about the length of time that Jesus/Yeshua/ישוע confirmed the covenant with his disciples. But, using the prophecy in Daniel chapter 9 clearly quantifies the length of time. Indeed, if Jesus/Yeshua/ישוע ministered for 3 ½ years then the age of his death would have been at 33 ½ years old.

Key Points for Consideration

- We have learned that Jesus/Yeshua/ישוע was the Passover lamb and perfect sacrifice.
- He was killed in the Springtime of the year on Nisan 14.


Working it Backwards

Let's revisit our calendar to see which month we land on when we work backwards from Nisan 14, the Passover date.

Did you find it?

Count backwards 33 ½ years from Nisan 14.

That's right! It's the month of Tishri. Or the 7th Jewish month.

How we remember the Lord's death


Through the partaking of bread and wine as a church assembly.





So, what about his birthday?

The Christ was killed for the remission of sin as the perfect passover and was born in the Autumn season.

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
